# **General Information**

#### Into



The Lecturer (Program Director) holds one of the most challenging and rewarding positions in the Grange. Primarily, it is the Lecturer's responsibility to present or arrange for a program at each regular Grange meeting. Lecturers should strive to have a program at each meeting, which include educational information, fun activities and/or inspirational messages. Music (live or recorded) should be included whenever possible. Consider having a program that helps promote the various contests such as a mini photography contest, art class, readings or recitations. Secondly, the Lecturer (Program Director) is a liaison to the community. Invite community members to share their talents with the Grange as part of a program. Respond in kind by being willing to present a program for other community organizations or sponsor educational programs for the community.

## Tips & Ideas

- Don't over-think your program. Don't let perfect be the enemy of the good.
- Make your programs interactive. Ask a lot of questions. Do trivia games. Pass out worksheets.
- Invite the community to your programs. After the business of the grange is concluded, open the meeting up to the public. Promote your program or speaker in the media.
- Be sure to promote state contests. *Take a look!* There are many changes to the program.
- Google crossword generator, bingo card generator, group game ideas, etc.
- Piggyback off educational resources provided by other groups.
- Learn a new skill or craft and teach it to your grange.
- Contact me for ideas if you are stuck.

#### Resources

- Include talent and resources from the community. Invite your neighbors to give talks to your grange doctors, farmers, artists, firefighters, business owners, the postmaster, local politicians, charity organizers almost anyone has something interesting to share.

The contest generally happens in April. Include a packing slip for your county from the back of this booklet or a similar one. Share the following contest pages with your members. Attach a form from the back of this booklet (or similar) to each entry. Entries cannot be submitted more than once.

# 2024 - Closeups

Fill the space with your special subject. Zoom right in! Submit your close-up photo of any subject, including yourself. These photos are sometimes called *macros*. They are a good way to feature color and texture without the distraction of a background.

## 2025 – Grange Halls, Fairs: Local, County, and State

There are many unique Grange Halls across the state. Maybe you are fortunate enough to meet in one. Here's an idea – invite a photographer to your Grange to give a lesson about taking good photos, then go outside and try it on your hall. If you don't have a hall, use someone else's.

- Div II Junior Grange Youth (age 10 to 14)
- Div III Junior Grange Youth (age 5 to 9)

#### Rules

- ONE submission allowed per member.
- The entry should have been received an award at Pomona. If that is impossible, the first-place subordinate entry may be submitted.
- All entries must be completed by the member, during the current contest year.
- No professional photographers may enter.
- Photos should be mounted on a rigid backing. No bulky frames or glass.
- No minimum size. Maximum size of 11×14 inches.
- Attach the form in the back of the handbook to the back of each entry.

#### **Prizes**

State awards may be certificates, ribbons and/or cash prizes. The National Contest no longer requires State award. See the "National Contests" page in this handbook for more information. (*NEW*)

- Technique: 20pts Focus, lighting, framing, etc.
- Composition: 30pts Framing, balance, interest, depth, etc.
- Subject/Theme: 20pts Meets theme criteria well.
- Originality: 20pts Creativity, concept, intent, etc.
- Mood: 10pts Wow factor, emotion, etc.

# Fine Art Contest



## 2024 – Barn Quilt

You have seen these beautiful "quilts" adorning barns all across the countryside. Barn quilts are a unique art form signifying Americana and country pride. Some patterns have different meanings. Research quilt blocks for some inspiration. Make one yourself in any medium. May be painted on canvas, paper, thin wood panel, whatever works.

## **2025 – Drawing**

Everyone – from Leonardo to the cave dwellers in France – has loved drawing to express their interests, ideas and even history. Submit a drawing of any kind. It can be pen, crayon, marker, pencil, etc. Drawings must be on paper and submitted with some sort of backing for safety of the piece. This is another good opportunity to get folks into your Grange Hall for a fun time developing creativity.

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- Div I Grange Member (age 14 and up)
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- Div III Junior Grange Youth (age 5 to 9)

#### Rules

- ONE submission allowed per member.
- The entry should have been received an award at Pomona. If that is impossible, the first place (or only) subordinate entry may be submitted.
- All entries must be completed by the member, during the current contest year.
- No professional artists may enter.
- Entries can be any medium: oil, acrylic, watercolor, pen, pencil, etc.
- Entries should be mounted on a rigid backing. No bulky frames or glass.
- Maximum size for barn quilt, 14 inches square. For drawing, 11x14 inches.
- Attach the form in the back of the handbook to the back of each entry.

#### **Prizes**

State awards may be certificates, ribbons and/or cash prizes.

- Technique: 20pts Use of implements, media, materials, etc.
- Composition: 30pts Framing, balance, interest, depth, etc.
- Subject/Theme: 20pts Meets theme criteria well.
- Originality: 20pts Creativity, concept, intent, etc.
- Mood: 10pts Wow factor, emotion, etc.

# **Performing Arts Contest**

New York State Grange Lecturer's Program - October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2025 Divisions \*Age as of January 1st of the current year:

- Div I Grange Member (age 14 and up)
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- Div III Junior Grange Youth (age 5 to 9)

#### Rules

- Talent Contest categories: Instrumental (Solo and Group), Vocal (Solo and Group), Skit/Variety/Dance
- Works should be appropriate for mixed company, and of difficulty suitable for the member.
- Pomona Lecturers may hold a Pomona level Talent Show or contact Subordinate Lecturers to determine those interested in performing at the State Talent Show. State Lecturer should be notified by April 15<sup>th</sup> for entries in contest.
- No professional performers may enter. A professional is defined as someone who receives significant financial gain from performance or acting as an instructor in a particular category.
- All winners will receive a ribbon. Best of Show will receive \$50.00 and will be invited to perform at the State Fair on Grange Day, State Grange Session, Northeast Lecturers' Conference, and at the National Grange Evening of Excellence during National Grange Convention.
- The Best of Show winner may NOT compete in the same category the following year, but the winner can enter in another category.
- No minimum length. Maximum length of **5 minutes**.

## 2024 – History Piece

Submit any kind of writing about the history of the Grange. Create an article, online post, letter, booklet, pamphlet – anything at all featuring the history of the Grange in general or your grange specifically. Please include a note about the purpose of the piece or where it was featured.

#### 2025 – Worksheet/Puzzle

Help your Worthy Lecturer out! Plan out and create a worksheet or puzzle to be used at a Grange meeting. Creativity is key! It could be a traditional find-a-word or crossword, quiz, escape room, or any type of educational tool to foster interest in a particular topic.

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#### Rules

- ONE submission allowed per member.
- The entry should have been received an award at Pomona. If that is impossible, the first place (or only) subordinate entry may be submitted.
- All entries must be completed by the member, during the current contest year.
- Representatives can be at any level: local, county, state, national, etc.
- No minimum or maximum length. Entries should be typed.
- For the letter, submit a printed copy neatly folded in an envelope.
- For the article, submit a copy of its published form neatly folded in an envelope.
- Please *omit or redact any identifying information* for judging purposes.
- Attach the form in the back of the handbook to the back of each entry.

#### **Prizes**

State awards may be certificates, ribbons and/or cash prizes.

- Technique: 20pts Grammar, usage, language, etc.
- Composition: 30pts Ideas, expression, flow, etc.
- Subject/Theme: 20pts Meets theme criteria well.
- Originality: 20pts Creativity, concept, intent, etc.
- Mood: 10pts Wow factor, persuasive, effective, etc.

# **Promotion Contest**



#### 2024 – Include the Youth

Plan and create anything to include youth in your Grange. Reach out to the local FFA or 4-H clubs with an event, sponsor a youth event in your community or host something for Grange youth in the area. Whatever your Grange is working on, all the members can join in to promote the event in their own way. Submit your flyer, photos, posters or anything else you used for your event to be judged.

#### 2025 – Social Media Post

This may be a challenge for some of you. Get someone tech savvy to help if need be. Ready??? Create a Facebook post, Instagram, X Post, Truth Social, etc. promoting anything about Grange. An event, history, feature Grange month, whatever you like. Make sure to include a photo (or three or more...). Print your piece out to be judged. Use hashtag #GrangePromo2025 so we can see them all. #### <u>Divisions</u> \* Age as of January 1st of the current year.

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#### Rules

- ONE submission allowed per member.
- The entry should have been received an award at Pomona. If that is impossible, the first place (or only) subordinate entry may be submitted.
- All entries must be completed by the member, during the current contest year.
- Content is more important the printing quality. Don't worry!
- Minimum size 8.5 x 11 inches. Maximum size of 24 x 36 inches (standard tri-fold size).
- Attach the form in the back of the handbook to the back of each entry.
- Include a description of when and where you promoted the grange with the materials you created. Include a photo is at all possible. Email it to me if you can.

#### **Prizes**

State awards may be certificates, ribbons and/or cash prizes.

- Technique: 20pts Grammar, usage, language, use of images, color, etc.
- Composition: 30pts Ideas, expression, flow, etc.
- Subject/Theme: 20pts Meets theme criteria well.

# Featured Program



## 2024 – Family Safety

Keeping your family safe is a never-ending challenge. But everyone has a part they can play. There are many things to consider. Fire safety is a classic concern, but have you discussed your fire escape plan lately? What about safety in the community for children and adults? Consider topics that don't get talked about often such as food safety, online scams, or emotional tools to deal with difficult relationships.

- Talk to local experts about topics you can share as part of a lecturer's program. Don't forget to invite him/her to a meeting.
- Obtain information from safety-themed organizations online and distribute to members.
- Arrange an event with first responders and invite the community. Don't forget in include information for all ages!

## 2025 – Community Education

When we think "education" we think schools. But learning is so much more. Ideally, it never stops throughout our lifetimes. There are so many ways that we learn and education ourselves and those around us. Think about ways education is happens in your community. I thought about churches, homeschooling groups, RPG clubs, beekeeping clubs, adult education programs at the school, 4-H and FFA, and the list goes on.

- Invite the local librarian to a Grange meeting to discuss how the library is so much more than books anymore. So may programs!
- Organize a workshop or talk that is open to the general public before or after your regular Grange meeting. Maybe one of your members has expertise to share.
- Find out how your Grange can support a local group in their educational efforts.
